## Scientists identify bones found near Powder Magazine in Williamsburg as Confederate soldiers

WILLIAMSBURG, VIRGINIA—Colonial Williamsburg archaeologists have determined that the remains of 21 or 22 men found in a historic area of the city belong to Confederate soldiers, according to a report in the *Daily Press*. Archaeologists identified bones discovered in Colonial Williamsburg as belonging to Confederate soldiers. More than a year ago, scientists uncovered a mass grave near the Powder Magazine on Duke of Gloucester Street. The old building was once used to store guns in the 1700s. However, Dr. Jack Gary, the director of archaeology for Colonial Williamsburg, said researchers began studying the remains in March 2023. The men likely died in a Union-operated hospital established after the Battle of Williamsburg on May 5, 1862, during which there were 1,682 Confederate and 2,283 Union casualties. "Multiple buildings were taken over to be used as hospitals," he said. That includes a Baptist church that once stood next to where the bones were found, and it may also be the link to identifying the buried soldiers. "The way we might be able to do that is through a list of named individuals who died in the hospital," said Gary. The list of 59 names includes descriptions of patients who died, and scientists hope that what they learn from the bones will identify the soldiers. Scientists are looking to find out details such as the ages of the soldiers buried. The men's remains will eventually be reburied, along with the artifacts found with them, including a snuff bottle, toothbrush, buttons, and gold coins. "I'm really happy we're able to work toward identifying these guys (and) then provide some level to dignity" in their reburial, said Jack Gary.

#### Letter from General Nathan B. Forrest to His Son William Montgomery Forrest

William Montgomery Forrest was the son of General Nathan B. Forrest. The following page contains the only known picture of William in a Confederate uniform, he was 14 when the war started. He attempted to join the Tennessee Mounted rifles with his father, but his age disallowed him. He would later join his father's command and was on his staff. By age 18, he had been wounded three times in combat ...one at Fort Donelson, the battle of Harrisburg (Tupelo) and Spring Hill Tennessee.

By the end of the war near Gainesville Alabama, General Forrest fearing he was going to be killed wrote his son Willie a letter as a guide for him to live by.... I quote. "What I must desire of you my son, is to never gamble or swear. These are baneful vices and I trust you will never practice either. As I grow older, I see the folly of these vices and beg that you will never engage in them. Your life has heretofore been elevated and characterized to a high tone morality, and I trust your name will never be stained by the practice of those vices which have blighted the prospects of some of the most promising youth of our country. Be honest, be truthful in all your dealings with the world. Be cautious of the selection of your friends. Shun the society of the low and vulgar. Strive to elevate your character and to take a high and honorable position in society. You are my only child, the pride and hope of my life. You have fine intellect, talent of the highest order. I have watched your entrance on the threshold of manhood and life with all the admiration of a proud father, and I trust your future career will be an honor to yourself and a solace to my declining years. If we meet no more on earth, I hope you will keep this letter prominently before you and remember it as coming from your affectionate father."

Willie would later graduate from the University of Mississippi and have four children.
